Rick has DISCOVERED a 1966, Sprint 200 Mustang in Pomona, Florida that has managed to blow an old theory that suggests these limited edition Mustangs were strictly a spring of 1966 introduction. The discovered Sprint 200 Mustang is a fastback model which makes it a rare unit to begin with. The icing on the cake is an assembly date of November 27, 1965, making it the earliest known 1966 Sprint 200 Mustans. The 1966 Sprint 200 Mustans were a promotional tool designed to help celebrate the Mustang's One Millionth Anniversary in the spring of 1966. Plus, this promotion helped Ford sell more six cylinder models as well to counterbalance the demand for V-8s.
